School's Challenge

Last Year's Geological Society NW Regional Heat of the School's Challenge was won by Runshaw College, Leyland. They won not only our gorgeous blue john fluorite trophy, but also the task of hosting the competition for 2019. Hence, on Tuesday 22nd January, a team of six students from Altrincham Grammar School For Boys and a team of four students from Aquinas College, Stockport arrived at Runshaw College to challenge for the title.

Altrincham presented first, with a quite terrifying look at the Yellowstone Supervolcano and the ways in which it could suddenly dish out death and destruction on a huge scale. A death- and-destruction theme continued with the presentation from Aquinas and their discussion of the Anthropocene, and the numerous ways in which the human species has contributed to the slow poisoning of the planet. Finally, our hosts Runshaw presented on terraforming – maybe there is some hope for us as a species in the future?!

The presentations were followed by all three teams taking part in our quiz, whilst our four judges: Katherine Harrison from Manchester University, Chris Oates from Soiltechnics, Martin Lucass from REC and Marie Convery, went off to judge the poster competition.

The quiz was great fun – with some challenging questions from many different aspects of geology.

Marks from the presentation, poster and quiz were totted up, and this year's winners were Altrincham Grammar School For Boys, who took home the blue john trophy and the opportunity to attend the final of the competition at Geol Soc HQ in Burlington House in March, which THEY WON!! Huge congratulations to the team!

Lecture Series 2018/19

Our first lecture was in October from Keith Seymour, GSL Vice President for Regional Group, "Reflections of a Retired Hydrogeologist on the use and management of the Permo-Triassic Sandstone Aquifers of NW England" (Attendance: 43).

Chris Martin from BP, and Working Party Chair, presented our November lecture at Manchester University on the recently published Engineering Geology Special Publication: "Engineering Geology and Geomorphology of Glaciated and Periglaciated Terrains". Geological Society Code of Conduct for Meetings and other Events

- The Geological Society of London is a professional and learned society, which, through its members, has a duty in the public interest to provide a safe, productive and welcoming environment for all participants and attendees of our meetings, workshops, and events regardless of age, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, race, ethnicity, religion, disability, physical appearance, or career level.
- This Code of Conduct applies to all participants in Society related activities, including, but not limited to, attendees, speakers, volunteers, exhibitors, staff, service providers, representatives to outside bodies, and applies in all GSL activities, including ancillary meetings, events and social gatherings.

Breach of the Code of Conduct

- If an incident of proscribed conduct occurs either within or outside the Society's premises during an event, then the aggrieved person or witness to the proscribed conduct is encouraged to report it promptly to a member of staff or the event's principal organiser.
- Once the Society is notified, a member of staff or a senior organiser of the meeting will discuss the details with the individual making the complaint. Any witnesses who have been identified, and then the alleged offender will be consulted before determining an appropriate course of action.
- Confidentiality will be maintained to the extent that it does not compromise the rights of others.
